

Dear friends at Holy Communion,

Many of you may already know the three Afghan men who came to us in February have now moved on. The first to go was Ezatullah, who joined Army friends in Nebraska. Next to leave us was Mohammed, who moved to San Antonio to join a brother and nephew there — but not before we managed to help him deal with some health issues. The last to leave, just recently, was Noor Wali Shah, whom we had grown to love. Noor Wali Shah worked at O & H Bakery for a number of months. (Thanks to Eric Olesen for facilitating his employment and that of three other Afghan refugees.) Noor Wali Shah decided to go to San Antonio with another Afghan family who had become his de facto family here in the States. We were sorry to see him go, but we support his decision to do so. And we wish all three of them well. Especially we hope that one day they will be able to bring their wives and children to the US.

Thanks to all of you who contributed money towards the expenses incurred. Thanks to others for your time in providing transportation, help with procuring necessary documents such as Wisconsin ID's, or teaching English. We'd like to single out Mary Beth and Harry Huizinga, Val Connor, Gregg and Kylee Albright, Cathie Lehman, but especially Ann Heide, who put in countless hours helping not only our three guys but also members of another Afghan family sponsored by the congregation at St. Mesrob.

And thanks to those of you who provided furnishings for the apartment. Next week, we will begin the work of reversing the process we started last January – i.e. returning the apartment to the empty state in which we found it. If anyone who donated items wants these items back, please contact one of us and we will make arrangements for you to come pick them up. Whatever is left will be donated to Feather a Nest, an organization that provides furniture and other household items for people who are starting from scratch due to eviction, homelessness, or losses due to fires or other events.

Again, thank you for joining us on this journey.

QUILTING GROUP

The book club is reading a book about cold, as in a trip to the Antarctic. We will be reading the book The Endurance: Shackleton's Legendary Antarctic Expedition by Caroline Alexander. In August of 1914, Ernest Shackleton and 27 crew members set sail for the Antarctic in their ship, Endurance. They are trying to win the last unclaimed prize in the history of exploration: the first crossing on foot of the Antarctic continent. They come within 85 miles of their destination, when Endurance becomes trapped in the ice pack. Their ordeal would last 20 months. Alexander has included Australian photographer Frank Hurley's record of the adventure. The collection has never before been published so comprehensively. There are several other books available about this adventure.

If you are interested in discussing the Shackleton's expedition to Antarctic, want to learn more about it, or just review the photographs, you are welcomed to join us. We will be meeting at Julie Burton's home at 136 Steeplechase Dr, Racine on January 11, 2023 at 10 am.

Our future selections are <u>Demon Copperhead</u> by Barbara Kingsolver on February 8 and <u>Homegoing</u> by Yaa Gyasi on March 8. Homegoing is the Kenosha read for 2023.

Third Tuesday Bible Study

January 17th our study of the Gospel of Mark will begin our winter Zoom meetings. From 10:00 until 11:30 (or 12:00) we can stay out of the cold and get together by internet. Julie Burton will send out the connection in early January.

"The Mystery Of the Kingdom" begins on page 104 when Jesus is telling his disciples that they can understand "the knowledge of the kingdom of God" that many others may "hear and not understand."

Then Jesus follows with the familiar parable of the Sower of the Seed in Mark 4:13-20. Barclay reminds us not to despair when it seems that all is fruitless (page 112). "Sow the seed. Leave the rest to God."

Mark 4:21 is another familiar saying of Jesus: a lamp is meant to be "brought in to be set upon a lamp stand" (page 112). Barclay tells the history of Christians who died rather than deny their faith (page 115-116). Are WE willing to stand up for our faith if challenged by critics or oppression?

This is a tough section in our study of Mark. It challenges our faith and our commitment. We are strengthened by meeting together on Zoom January 17th beginning at 10:00. So grateful for technology!


