

This is a one-time scholarship (\$500) for youth who have been active in the life of faith (Sunday School, Confirmation, Volunteering) at Holy Communion. There is a short application requirement. March 21st is the date to continue the study of the Gospel of Mark. During these cold winter months we meet by zoom from 10:00 to 11:30. Our discussion will be from Mark 4:35 to Mark 5:20, pages 132 to 145 in William Barclay.

It begins with Jesus calming the storm on Lake Galilee. Barclay draws the parallel with Jesus calming the storms we face with sorrow, problems, and anxiety.

Then comes the section about the demon-possessed man. After Jesus cast the demons into 2000 pigs that rushed into the lake and drowned, he received much criticism and

"they began to urge Jesus to get out of their territory" Mark 5:17.

Barclay tells us that this healing of the demon-possessed man happened in Decapolis, essentially a Greek city. And this tells us that Christianity was already reaching beyond Judaism and going out into all the world.

What a great way for us to realize how Jesus was reaching beyond his own nationality and into all the world.

Tuesday, March 21st, meet by zoom from 10:00 to 11:30 to discuss Mark 4:35 to 5:20, pages 132-145. A variety of translations are welcome.

The book club is joining the Kenosha Public Library, which has chosen for their Big Read program this year, the book, <u>Homegoing</u> by Yaa Gyasi. The setting is Ghana in the 18th century. Two half-sisters are born into different villages, each unaware of the other. One will marry and Englishman and lead a life of comfort. The other will be captured in a raid and sold into slavery. The story follows the parallel paths of the two sisters and their descendants through eight generations. The novel illuminates slavery's troubled legacy and shows how the memory of captivity has been inscribed on the soul of our nation. On October 16, 2022, <u>The Racine Journal-</u>



<u>Times</u> printed their editorial of the choice of the Kenosha Public Library's pick. "<u>Homegoing</u> is not and easy read. It is unsettling, uneasy, because it shines a light on the fabric of the history of the slave trade and the long shadows it still casts today."

January was one of the busiest month we have had in a long time. We served 1202 people. The last time we served numbers this high was in 2020.

In 2020 and before we were getting a sufficient amount of food from the government and Racine County Food Bank. Recently the amount of food we receive has been decreasing each month and we were informed that it will continue this way. Our shoppers are having a hard time buying many of the things we need because of limited supplies at some of the grocery stores. This makes the donations we receive from you more important than ever so that we can continue to provide healthy, balanced meal items for those in need in our community. We are incredibly grateful to all who add a few items for the pantry to their shopping carts. We know budgets are tight for many people and we give thanks for your generous gifts to our ministry.

We always need brown paper grocery bags and clean, lightly used, plastic shopping bags. If you receive calendars, greeting cards, or pens and pencils you will not use, please bring them to the pantry. We have also had requests for Bibles and children's Bible storybooks. If you have any you no longer use you can donate them to the pantry.

As always we are so very grateful to all who contribute money and food and those who volunteer their time. We could not continue this ministry without you!


<u>Scrip</u>

There you can buy or order gift cards for grocery stores, gas stations, department stores, restaurants, online retailers, and even hotels and other travel related businesses. Scrip is an easy way for you to support the church as you do your day to day shopping! You pay the face value of the card and get to spend the full value of the card. HCLC purchases the cards for a discounted rate so we earn a percentage of each purchase.
