"I felt a bit vulnerable when I was asked to write my faith statement. In faith statements I have reviewed, the author seemed so sure of what they trusted in God, with statements of "I believe this" or "I believe that." But for me, I have never really been too sure of my faith. I wasn't sure what I was supposed to believe in, much less what I actually believe. It always seemed like one giant question mark in my life. I have always had such a strange relationship with church. When I was younger, my parents took me to many kinds of churches. I dipped my feet in so many religions, I never felt like I had a concrete relationship with God or Jesus or any church for that matter. As I grow deeper in my religious journey, I am still confused of how I feel about "the church." When I pray, I do not feel a connection to God. I mean yes, there are times when I pray when I feel I really need God. But it usually feels like I am speaking to nothing. Sometimes I pray and what I asked of God is answered in the actions of other people, which just confuses me more.

The only time I feel some sort of divine presence is with music. When I was a child, I fell in love with playing the piano. The way I was able to read the notes like some sort of secret code, finding my place on the keys like discovering new land that had never been touched, and struggling with the more difficult pieces until I figured them out was an excuse to leave the world. Music never bothered or boasted, or poked, or pried, it always gave me a chance to breathe, letting me forget my worries. When I start to play a piece, something takes over my body, I can feel some sort of spirit inside me. As a child I wasn't exactly sure what to call this aside from magic. There has always been something about putting my hands on the piano, my whole entire world disappearing. I am able to just focus solely on what notes I'm going to touch next. And that's all that matters while my fingers are on the keys. I can create this music with my own fingers, I can read this different language that so few people can, and I am able to tell myself this is what I am doing, this is what I am putting my mind to. I have learned that faith does not require an absence of doubt, but it does require some belief. For a while I struggled with believing, but now I know that music is my way of believing. My expression of faith is not through prayer but through music. When I play the piano, I feel closer to God. Playing the piano brings me closer to God than prayers or homilies or psalms ever could. But it is not just when I play the piano. My music is a gift God gave me.

When I was born, I was like a blank piece of sheet music waiting to be written. As I grow up, I am writing the measures of my life, each one different and unique, changing with every note through my childhood, then moving on to college and beyond. Of course, some of the measures have been hard to learn, the notes difficult to find, and have left me feeling sad and frustrated. Yet, when I finally figure out sections of the piece and can go about it freely and happily, those measures become my favorite. "Throughout my life, the church has always been a part of me.
