#### **SHARING POSSESSIONS**

Twice in the book of Acts, it is recorded that the life of the earliest Christian community in Jerusalem was characterized by the sharing of possessions. Acts 2:44 and 4:32 describe how those who owned goods and property sold them, and how the Apostles took responsibility for distributing the proceeds to the needy in their community. This sharing of things was no doubt fed by the expectation that Jesus would soon return from Heaven. But it also reflected the fact that wealth was increasingly concentrated in the hands of a relatively few people. This is not the only place in the Bible, where this ethic was practiced. In fact, there were several **renewal movements** in Israel's history where the sharing of possessions took place. After the Jewish War... it was compulsory.

But there were problems in Jerusalem. Not all members of the community were honest in their generosity. Ananias and Sapphira, who **secretly** retained some money they had received after selling some property, were struck dead (Acts 5:1 -6). Neither was the distribution always fair. Greek speaking Christians, probably wealthier than their Jewish brethren, complained about the neglect of their widows in the distribution. The selling of property may have contributed to the difficulties experienced by the Jerusalem church during an empire wide famine in 46-47 CE. Paul's collection for the **poor** church in Jerusalem (Galatians 2:10) may also have been an indication of its economic distress.

Such is the uneasy relationship between greed and faith, money and the church. Yet Jesus spoke about money often. Jesus knew that generous people are happier people. And so he asked us to give... generously and joyfully. It is not compulsory (anymore) to give to the church. We ask you to give out of love.

To give because you are grateful for what God has accomplished in your life. And we do appreciate all that you do and all of the ways that you give. And so whether you give expectantly, or extravagantly, or reverently or generously,

We hope that it brings you joy. Because that is the point.

#### Third Tuesday Bible Study

The study of the Gospel of Mark will meet April 16th by Zoom. The discussion will focus on Mark 10:1 to 10:27, pages 275 - 288. Everywhere Jesus went, crowds came to him looking for him to teach them. Verses 10:1-12 deals with adultery and divorce. William Barclay explains that "the loose sexual morality of his day must be mended" (page 279). Marriage is a responsibility and a spiritual unity.

It struck me as significant that these verses are followed by children being brought to Jesus for him to touch them (page 280). Even Barclay suggests that Jesus must have taken time to laugh and enjoy them. Then Barclay lists the characteristics of children that we grownups should adopt. We should have humility, obedience, trust, and a short memory of being treated unfairly.

Again, following the example of children, a rich man comes to Jesus and asks, "what am I to do to inherit eternal life?" (page 282). Ahh. Jesus asks all of us what have we done to serve others? Barclay points out that to be respectable is not taking away from others. But to be Christian is to GIVE to others! Part of that giving is in our church offering. Then, what does our church do with that offering?

Our lesson concludes with Mark 10:23-27. Trusting in money makes it very difficult to enter the kingdom of heaven. Salvation is not because of what we have, but a gift from God.

April 16th our study of Mark will look at Mark 10:1 to 10:27 and pages 275 to 288 in Barclay. We will meet by Zoom from 10:00 until 11:30. We hope April showers will bring rain and not snow.
