Food Pantry

In June the pantry served 297 households, a total of 1061 people. In just two days at the end of July they served 108 family, a total of 398 people. The shelves are emptying quickly! For the month of August they need donations of peanut butter, canned tuna, canned peaches, canned mixed fruit, peas, and mixed vegetables. They cannot use any partially used or open packages of food or personal care products like shampoo or lotion if the seal is broken. Last month we had an overabundance of plastic shopping bags and asked people to hold off on bringing them in.

This month they are getting fresh produce to distribute and are going through plastic bags quickly. If you have any clean, lightly used plastic bags, or large brown paper shopping bags, please bring them in. We are very grateful to all who donate to the pantry. We could not continue this ministry without your generosity!

Quilting Group

The HCLC quilters meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month at 1:00 p.m. to work on quilts for Lutheran World Relief. You do not need to have any prior quilting experience to help them.

The quilters can also use donations of cotton fabric and lightly used full, queen, or king size flat sheets. You can also make a monetary donation to be used for quilt batting. 
Third Tuesday Bible Study

August 20th our study of the Gospel of Mark will begin with Mark 11:15-19 on page 316. "The Wrath Of Jesus!" Now that's a tough start. But the Jewish temple had become a huge market place and a rip off for anyone seeking to give an offering with their worship. When Jesus overturned the tables in anger it was just after crowds of people greeted him with hosannas. Holy Week is exhausting with the excitement of Palm Sunday and the anger in the followed by the trial and crucifixion.

Mark follows this tough drama with "Have faith in God" (Mark 11:22) that he will answer your needs. Now the Jewish leaders ask him, "by what authority do you do these things?" (Mark 11:28) on page 323. And "Jesus began to speak to them in parables" (Mark 12:1). He even quotes scripture to these learned Jews. These Jewish leaders recognized that "he spoke this parable against them" (Mark 12:12). This begins the terrible plot to crucify Jesus. Mark 11:15 to 12:12 on pages 316-330 will be the Bible study for August 20th. Meet at Julie Burton's home (136 Steeplechase Drive) from 10:00 to 11:30.

The book club is off on a science fiction/fantasy adventure. We are discussing <u>A Wrinkle in Time</u> by Madeleine L'Engel.

Late one night Meg, her brother, Charles, and their friend, Calvin are swept away on a mission to save Mr. Murray. They travel via a wrinkle that transports them across space and time to a distance planet. There they discover a dark force that threatens their safety and that of the whole universe.


If you have medical equipment you no longer need to use, please consider donating it to our lending closet. Donations can be brought to the church office during the week or to church on Sunday morning.






