In Matthew...





For the new year the book club is reading and discussing, <u>The Moon is Down</u> by John Steinbeck. The title is inspired by a scene from act 2 of Macbeth. ("The moon is down"...foreshadowing the descent of evil on the kingdom.)

BOX CLB In the summer of 1941, Steinbeck was asked to write a work of propaganda to tell of the plight of the refugees of the war in Europe. He decided to write about the psychological effects of enemy occupation upon the populace of conquered nations. The novel was not well received. The controversy raged on for months. However, the novel had found a receptive audience in

Nazi-occupied Europe. In spite of the Nazis' efforts to suppress the novel, he novel, hundreds of thousands of copies in seven languages, clandestine editions circulated during the occupation. It was easily the most popular work of propaganda in occupied Western Europe. It is easy to figure out where the story is set, who the enemy is, and who the resistance is. The novel is relatively short, at 110 pages. After 1945, the novel has been published in approximately 28 different languages.

THIRD TUESDAY BIBLE STUDY

January 16th the study of the Gospel Of Mark will meet at the home of Julie Burton from 10:00 to 11:30. The study begins on page 253 with "The Cause Of Failure." What a beginning for the new year! The disciples had failed to heal a young boy who could not hear or speak. Why? "You don't live close enough to God" was the way William Barclay explained it.

After this rebuke, Jesus delivers another difficult message. "The Son of Man is being delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him..." (page 256). Now Jesus had the difficulty of ensuring that his message would spread. The twelve disciples did not understand what Jesus was telling them and were afraid to ask more questions. Instead, they began arguing "who would be the greatest" (page 257). Interestingly, Jesus responded by choosing a little child and pointed out that being close to God means being concerned about poor, ordinary people who are in need (page 260).

Mark 9:38-40 (page 261) is not interesting. The disciples rebuke a man driving out demons using the name of Jesus. But Jesus said, "He who is not against us is for us." Perhaps it reminds us to be more accepting of other styles of proclaiming a faith in Jesus.

Our January study concludes with Mark 9:41-42 (page 265) letting us know that our focus should be on the little, everyday things we can do to help people. Our focus on everyday needs is both meaningful and humbling.



If you've wondered how to volunteer to quilt for charity, look no further. Making Lutheran World Relief Mission Quilts is a tangible way to express love to our neighbors in need. Quilts can be used as warm bedding, simple tents or floor coverings. Each one reflects God's loving presence in a world rife with suffering.

LWR distributed its first quilts in 1945 to families in war-torn Europe following the Second World War. Within a decade, the ministry was reaching around the globe to villages far removed from the world's attention. Today, an average of 300,000 quilts are lovingly given worldwide each year.

Our quilters will meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays from 1:00 - 3:00. In January they will be meeting on the 9th and 23rd. They would love to have more help and everyone is welcome to join them.
